For the Bahamas, visit in April to August – while technically the low season, it can be one of the best times to visit as the windy winter cold fronts are over and you can enjoy perfectly still days.

Or an extended family reunion with multigenerational fun? Perhaps you're planning a couples' getaway with a few other likeminded friends. READY, SET, SAIL

Once the charter is booked, what do you need to know? What do you need to pack?
What about childcare? And are there any rules?
We help you prepare for the ultimate yachting vacation

B efore boarding your yacht, you'll fill out a preference list on everything from your favorite Champagne to what you'd like to eat for breakfast. The more precise you are, the easier it is for your crew to prepare for your charter and get a head start to make sure they have everything on board.

Likewise, letting the captain know what you want to do in advance is highly recommended. If you're interested in going places that are quiet and remote it would be silly for the captain to take you to Monaco, and if you want to see and be seen, it might not make sense to go to a remote island off Corsica. Captains and crew like to take time and do research into what guests will enjoy so they can personalize the itinerary to suit your needs. Make sure you let them know what you want so they can deliver it with aplomb.

This goes for events and celebrations, too. The chief stewardess can arrange all sorts of events, from barbecues on a private beach to themed parties – how about a Harry Potter birthday party for the young ones or a disco night for the adults? Entertainers can easily be flown in to join the yacht – anyone from magicians to DJs and singers – really giving the party some pizzazz.

Dividing the rooms

Many charter yachts are designed with multiple chartering parties in mind and there will be more than one sizeable suite, so that no one feels demoted in a smaller cabin. Typically, the largest suite goes to the principal charterer – the one who is inking the contract and footing the brunt of the bill. But if you are planning to travel with couples only and will be sharing costs equally, look for a yacht that has a few master-worthy VIP cabins, and have a





discussion in advance about who will get which rooms, to avoid any awkward situations once you step on board.

Collaborate with your captain

Heed your captain's advice on itineraries, transit times and places to visit – there's no point trying to travel too far and not enjoying the journey. Captains know how to get the most out of the time available on board. They can also sometimes "trick" the itinerary by traveling when guests are asleep – the evening can often be when the weather is calmer as well.

Pack smart

Exploring the Arctic? Leave the tux at home. Wintering in the Caribbean? Pack light materials but also something to cover up with in the evenings. Yachts have a no high heels policy to protect the decks, so be prepared to go barefoot – but there should be no problem having a pedicure on board if need be. Many charter brokers recommend bringing fewer shoes than you'd pack for other trips as so much time is spent barefoot – or with your toes in the sand.

Take advantage of having your own private chef

The chef is here for you. Sometimes that means a midnight snack, other times that means not having breakfast until midday, but it always means getting exactly the cuisine you're after. A private yacht chef is better than a restaurant, it's more personal. Rather than having to please an entire restaurant, it's all about one table and making you and your guests happy. It's an added level of attention not found on most lux vacations. Any dietary requests can be met, whether you're a vegan or just have a specific craving. Food can be flown in and couriered to the yacht if not available in local markets, making Beluga caviar,

Japanese wagyu beef and jamón ibérico as ubiquitous as Cristal Champagne.

Bring a nanny

Don't assume that the crew will be your nanny. While many crew are excellent with children and can plan fun activities with kids, teaching them watersports and more, if you are looking to unwind completely, then perhaps consider bringing your own childcare. Taking along your nanny is like bringing a part of home – the comfort it brings a child, who's suddenly thrust into a new environment, cannot be underestimated. Your nanny will know you and your child's routine and keep them on it, despite any jet lag. If your kids are happy and entertained, you'll be happy, too.

Mind the rules

Some yachts don't allow smoking – and some areas where you cruise don't allow jet skis, so heed your captain's and crew's advice before lighting up or going for a spin.

Utilize the boat

Make use of every bit of the boat. The yacht will have amazing toys, enabling all sorts of watersports, and maybe even a yoga instructor, masseuse, hairdresser, and diving instructor. You might want to wake up in the morning and do yoga, go diving and get a massage. The best part of a yacht? It's like a floating hotel, but one you have all to yourself. Use it to the full.

achts might be fun for adults, but for kids they are even better – presenting one enormous playground surrounded by a giant swimming pool. Kids can ride a huge inflatable slide into the ocean, follow a treasure map on a hunt for pirate's gold and enjoy elaborate theme dinners put on by the crew. After an endless day of fun, the sundeck transforms into an outdoor movie theater and there's a hot fudge sundae bar to make their favorite treats. What's not to like?

It's easy to assume, when seeing the media coverage of pop stars and supermodels aboard luxury yachts, that this is an "adults only" playground, but this couldn't be further from the truth. A yacht charter is a way for families to enjoy quality time like no other, creating everlasting memories. And never have there been so many luxury charter yachts that are "kid-friendly," and your charter broker can provide you with recommended yachts from which to plan your next family yacht vacation.

Safe and sound

Parents may worry about the safety of their children on a yacht, what with that giant swimming pool surrounding it, but crew are fully prepared to handle any safety concerns. Some yachts are also equipped with baby gates on stairwells or add safety nets around the decks for protection when small children are aboard. And crew are always on the alert, providing extra eyes. Life jackets will be available in sizes to fit youngsters comfortably and will quickly seem natural to them when in and around the water.

Kid-friendly crew

For one luxury yacht skipper, his first question to potential crew is: "Do you like kids?" Yachts singled out by charter brokers as a good fit for families and that have a reputation for being "pro-kid" usually have crew members in their 20s who genuinely enjoy having youngsters around.

All the toys

A luxury charter yacht is like a big toy chest. Most carry an entire fleet of water toys: inflatable banana boats for wild-ride towing, to tubes and rafts. Snorkel gear is available in small sizes, and the crew is trained to teach the kids to snorkel and will accompany them for safety.

Video games can raise a question: some parents want them, while others want to wean their children away from the electronic world. One yacht has an arcade with more than 300 video games, while another luxury yacht skipper confiscates the electronic games that kids bring aboard, at the parents' request, telling the kids such devices interfere with the navigational equipment just like on airplanes. But, as a replacement, that crew keeps the kids fully engaged with adventure tours, shelling and playing with water toys.

One yacht chef dresses kids up in mini sous chef outfits and has them help learn cooking skills, while the officers on another yacht encourage youngsters to assist in



running the yacht, from actually steering (under supervision) to learning course-plotting.

Another yacht takes kids ashore, where they "discover" a bottle on the beach, complete with an "ancient" treasure map, which sends the excited kids on a hunt leading to a treasure chest filled with chocolate coins.

The kids' menu

Kid-friendly yachts always go the extra mile when it comes to provisioning, and a pre-charter questionnaire will make sure that the chef has the favorite treats stocked – or how about an ice cream sundae bar? If a special baby food or formula is needed, it will be in the pantry. Delicious and healthy foods can also be prepared to make both the kids' taste buds and the parents happy.

Part of the pleasure of chartering for adults is happy hour in the evening, and

crew can include the kids by creating "virgin" pina coladas or Shirley Temple daiquiris for the youngsters.

Time out

Crew aren't babysitters but understand that parents need some private time, whether to walk on the beach, curl up with a book or disappear behind closed doors. Luxury yacht crew are prepared to provide adventures for the children, such as a game of miniature beach golf or an island picnic.

Yes, kids have it better than ever aboard charter yachts. Chocolate fountains, treasure hunts, jet ski races... it sounds like a lot of fun. And it is – for everyone. Your kids will return home with plenty to "show-and-tell" in school, from shells discovered on beaches to pictures of dolphins jumping in the yacht's wake. And as every parent knows, if they are happy, you are happy, too.

the crew is an experienced personal trainer or yoga teacher – or you can bring your trainer along with you if you prefer.


Top facilities

Whatever you're accustomed to in your own gym routine, you'll find it on a charter yacht – or with a beach run on shore. How much equipment is available will depend on the size of the yacht, of course, so check with your charter broker about what specific equipment is available, but whatever is there, you can expect the best quality gear.

Beyond the basic equipment, most yacht fitness areas not only have spectacular views, but hammams and even a spa pool to ease aching muscles. Some offer sliding doors for fresh air to waft in, while others are set on the beach club on the lower deck, so you can cool off with a quick swim in the sea right after a workout. Welcome to the gym aboard a luxury charter yacht! Many of the yachts refer to these as "wellness areas," since they often combine spa and beauty treatment spaces as well.

Fit crew

Modern yacht crew are multi-talented, so you may have an experienced personal

trainer to work with you to tone up, slim down and feel better. Complementing this are crew with massage training as well as yoga or pilates teachers. If there is an extra cabin aboard, you might want to bring your own trainer along.

There are also many companies and brokerage houses today offering the full retreat experience – flying in the top yoga teachers, meditation masters and gurus to bring Zen your way. Why not turn the entire yacht into an unbelievably chic and totally private retreat at sea? Check with your charter broker for details on the various crew talents and the specialists available for hire.

Healthy cuisine

If there is only one word to describe luxury yacht charter chefs, it has to be "flexible." Need a gluten-free or dairy-free diet? Same for alkaline, vegan and even the Whole3o. Just let your charter broker know on the preference sheet they send you.

Water workout

Even though you'll have a wellness center aboard, don't forget that you're floating in Mother Nature's exercise area. Taking a swim daily, regardless of whether it's swimming, snorkeling or diving, is a total body workout that can buff up your arms and back, while burning calories at the



same time. Then you have water toys such as the stand-up paddleboards, which are excellent for your upper body and core strength as well as your balance. Best of all, Yacht Golf is eco-conscious – the marine friendly Ecobioballs are actually fish food, so you'll be giving the fish a treat if you don't get that hole in one, and the balls that make it in the holes can be scooped up for later use.

Double the fun

The Vanqraft VQ16 combines the agility and fun of a scooter with the practicality of a tender. It is designed for easy handling and high performance. The driver straddles a center seat, like that found on





a personal watercraft, while other guests ride in bow seats or behind the driver, enjoying the thrill of the ride. Powered by a 200hp Yamaha I.8L engine with jet propulsion, it reaches top speeds of up to 50 knots with the Veloce version.

Fly with me

For those with America's Cup dreams, the 17ft F101 trimaran is the must-have toy. The F101 makes hydro-foiling seen in the Cup yachts accessible to nearly anyone, not just professional sailors. Inspired by the Moth class, they are designed to be hard to capsize and extremely user friendly. The assets of the boat include a long hull to prevent nose-diving, stability when foiling at low speeds and easy maneuverability. It can be singlehanded or enjoyed with two guests, flying along at speeds of 10 to 25 knots. Move over America's Cup pros!

Hang ten

A high-end electric surfboard for those who like to "hang ten" but desire a helping hand to get out past the breakers. The Lampuga Boost is an 8ft long board that can reach speeds of up to 34mph when planing with the 15hp electric engine, which charges from flat in as little as two hours. Controlling this jetboard is simple with its adjustable engine power so you can quickly switch from relaxed cruise to hot-blooded ride in seconds.

Bird's eve view

What better way to capture those precious memories from your superyacht vacation than from the sky? Easy to use and compact, the DJI Mavic Pro drone's trick is that it is foldable, taking it down to pocket size. The range of 4.3 miles and a flight time of 27 minutes should be more than sufficient, plus the new FlightAutonomy system means it can avoid obstacles all on



its own at speeds up to 22mph. Following a fast tender? Sport Mode lets you record using the 4K stabilized camera at speeds of up to 40mph.

It's electric

Having a bike on board is a great way to get around once you arrive in port, and an electric bike can make the touring even easier and faster. Utilizing a patent from BMW's i division, this is the world's first belt-driven full-suspension ebike. Thanks to their German colleagues, the HNF Heisenberg XF1 has a system that allows the drive motor to be attached to the swing

arm. On a normal ebike, the swing arm has to stiffen under acceleration, which interferes with the suspension. The XFI fixes this so you get a bike with greater traction and no rocking movement when accelerating or braking. The belt drive itself also supposedly requires less maintenance than a traditional gear and chain system. Power is provided by the Bosch battery and motor, with an 81 mile range.

Dry ride

Wahoo's LXO 32ft rigid inflatable (RIB) tender accommodates 12 to 14 guests in comfort while providing the incredibly dry for which RIBs are renown. The LXO packs a performance punch with blisteringly fast acceleration, taking off to a top speed of 60-plus knots. The boat is highly specced with all the latest Raymarine displays and entertainment systems along with teak detailing and freshwater showers.



Day 2 ▶ Highbourne Cay to Shroud Cay



Today, divers on board can wake up to an exhilarating plunge at the Exuma Wall, a 75ft descent, while others can learn scuba basics at a shallower location. Next, sail to Norman's Cay, infamous as Pablo Escobar's drug smuggling island in his heyday. The remains of one of his airplanes can be seen; sunk in shallow water, it makes an excellent snorkeling spot. Have lunch ashore at the Exumas institution of MacDuff's. Cruise into the harbor at uninhabited Shroud Cay in time for an al fresco dinner under a star-filled sky.



Day 3 ▶ Shroud Cay

to Warderick Wells

Wake up at peaceful Shroud Cay and feel as if you've gone to heaven. After breakfast, tender in to explore the tidal creek, which serves as a nursery for birds, sea turtles and fish. Cruise to Warderick Wells, home to the Exuma Cays Land and Sea Park. Kids can "discover" the skeleton of a 53ft sperm whale that washed up long ago. Runners should also rejoice – there are more than seven miles of trails to explore on shore.



Your captain will make an early start, so that you arrive at Bell's Cay as you're waking up, making it the perfect time for a morning dip at the Aquarium. You will soon see why this snorkel site earned its name as you'll be surrounded by fish. Then head over to Compass Cay, where you can swim with the friendly nurse sharks that are found off the docks. After that you can lunch on the divine burgers served here. Sunset cocktails and dinner can be enjoyed at the private island of Fowl Cay in the Hill House restaurant, with its 360 degree views of the surrounding islands. Spend the night at the Staniel Cay Yacht Club marina.

BAHAMIAN OUT ISLANDS

This adventurous yet closeto-home itinerary combines deserted islands and epic diving

hile the Bahamas have long been a popular destination for royalty, celebrities, and superyachts, the Bahamian Out Islands still offer secret, sparkling white beaches and uncrowded world-class diving for those prepared to venture off the beaten track.

The Out Islands are named as such because they are just that – out of the way, set apart from the main hubs of Nassau and Grand Bahama. Out here – among the likes of Eleuthera, Cat Island and the Exumas – there is not likely to be a cruise ship or a casino in sight.

This itinerary combines some of the best scuba spots in the region with secret anchorages and uninhabited islands. It not only takes you through some blessedly deserted and gorgeous islands, but it brings you to the Bahamas' most spectacular dive sites.

The Out Islands boasts wonderfully warm water – ranging from 76F to 84F – and it's crystal clear too, allowing diving in every type of location, including wrecks, reefs and mysterious blue holes. Divers can get up close to dolphins and sharks too, making for unforgettable experiences.

But best of all, it's still a very close flight from the US, allowing guests to have an adventure without having to travel very far to get there. This is the ideal trip for both those seeking adventure and those who want to relax in utter privacy.







ITINERARY



Day 1 ▶ Cape Eleuthera Marina

Guests meet the yacht at Cape Eleuthera Marina and, within hours, can venture out for their first dive at Bamboo Point.
The yacht will spend the night at anchor at the south end of Eleuthera for an evening spent stargazing on the sundeck while indulging in freshly made cocktails and a fabulous dinner.

Day 2 ► Eleuthera to Cat Island

At dawn, the yacht will depart for Hawk's Nest on Cat Island to the south. The remote island is hardly touched by tourism and has some exceptional diving, with an abundance of caves and coral canyons to discover. Guests can also enjoy secluded beaches or take the yacht's paddleboards and SeaBobs through crystal clear mangroves.

Day 3 ▶ Cat Island

In the morning, divers can head for Tartar Bank on the southeastern side of Cat Island. The bank disappears from a 62ft to a 2,950ft drop-off. While the divers are off exploring, the yacht will move over to Springfield Bay, the perfect spot for a fun beach barbecue, while any anglers on board can try their hand at casting a line.

Day 4 ▶ Cat Island to Conception Island

With no inhabitants,
Conception Island is a diamond
in the rough. Christopher
Columbus is said to have
landed here in 1942. The dives
have stunning coral gardens
and guests will encounter
large varieties of reef fish and
perhaps even a dolphin or two.



Guests can make the most of Conception Island's quiet waters and enjoy the yacht's assortment of water toys. The island also has a beautiful lake, filled with small green turtles.

Day 6 ► Conception Island to Rum Cay

The yacht will head to one of the best-kept secrets in the Caribbean - Rum Cay. This island is a looker, with long. white sand beaches, rolling green hills (elevation being rare in these low-slung islands) all framed by brilliant turquoise blue waters hiding vivid coral reefs. Guests can explore dropoffs, deep reefs, numerous tunnels and the wreck of HMS Conqueror, which was lost in 1861. After a day exploring, how about a drink in the sandy floored, and aptly named, Kay's Restaurant and Sand Bar.

Day 7 ► Rum Cay to San Salvador

Guests' final dive during this trip will be at the island of San Salvador, which is actually the exposed peak of a submerged 15.000ft mountain. You could easily spend a week in San Salvador. The island was originally inhabited by Lucayan tribes and called Guanahani. It was named San Salvador, or Holy Saviour, by Christopher Columbus, who landed here in 1492. There are four anchorages commemorating Columbus, including an underwater one meant to mark where La Pinta anchored. For their last night guests can dock at Riding Rock Marina or relocate to a remote beach.





Step back in time to the most colorful and evocative of Caribbean destinations

ith fabulous 1950s American cars, mind-blowing mojitos and the sense of stepping back in time, Cuba is a Caribbean destination with a difference.

Despite now being more accessible to superyachts, Cuba is still undeveloped and as a result has an unpolished charm. Traveling here requires an open and inquisitive mindset, certainly, but at the end of the day – or night, spent dancing salsa in Havana – there is always the comfort of your own superyacht to return to, which rivals any visitor accommodations found on shore.

When most people think of Cuba, they picture the crumbling, colorful architecture of Havana. But there is much to see beyond this fabled city, and luckily a yacht is just the right way to see it.

Cuba actually has some amazing diving – much of which you can have pretty much to yourself as the island is still off the yacht tourist track. Discovering Cuba by boat gives guests a chance to sample the history and heady nightlife of Havana while also taking in the island's natural beauty, all in supreme luxury and comfort on board the yacht of their choosing.

This itinerary combines the charms of old-school Havana with the raw wilderness, exceptional diving and sugar-white beaches of Cuba's idyllic southern coastline. Cuba will never be the same for you again.







Day 1 ▶ Havana

Meet the yacht at Marina
Hemingway, just 20 minutes
from downtown Havana, then
walk the city's streets, taking in
the curious contradiction of its
crumbling colonial architecture
and vibrant culture. In the
evening, arrive at the legendary
Tropicana in a classic American
car and enjoy the Latin music,
bright colors and plenty of
Cuban rum.

Day 2 ► Havana

Spend another day in this fascinating city and visit Papa Hemingway's favorite drinking haunts of El Floridita and Bodeguita del Medio. Take a short drive out of town and you can visit a cigar factory where the manager reads the latest newspapers to his workers as they roll their cigars – a beautiful old tradition.

Day 3 ▶ Rural Cuba

Head west from Havana to discover the tobacco plantations of the Viñales valley and the pine forest covered mountains of the Sierra de los Órganos. It's a beautiful, slow-paced corner of rural Cuba, and it offers a wonderful contrast to your time in Havana.

Day 4 ► Maria la Gorda

The yacht will then cruise onwards to the beautiful Maria





la Gorda and anchor in the crystal clear waters where the coral heads are just off the bow. This is the place for guests to jump in the water and enjoy fantastic snorkeling or scuba divers can visit Lost Paradise – a vibrant wall dive with a variety of swim-throughs and caves.

Day 5 ▶ Cayo Largo

Continuing east, guests can enjoy the tranquility of the small island of Cayo Largo, which is thought to have once been used as a base for the real pirates of the Caribbean. With clear waters and pristine beaches, it is the perfect place to make the most of your yacht's extensive collection of water toys. Enjoy dinner on board, likely the only yacht in this tranquil harbor.

Day 6 ▶ Jardines de la Reina

Today, it's time for more worldclass diving or snorkeling that few others have experienced. Jardines de la Reina is a 150 mile mangrove and coral island chain forming the third largest barrier reef in the world. Guests can snorkel or dive in the



marine park, which is bursting with vivid corals and exotic fish.

Day 7 ▶ Santiago de Cuba

Return to city life, in the form of the bustle of Santiago de Cuba, which is known for its Afro-Cuban cultural influence and colonial architecture.

A fleet of classic cars will be awaiting guests for a memorable drive back to the airport. Reluctantly make your way back to the modern world, leaving glorious memories of Cuba behind – but maybe bring a few cigars back with you.



VIRGIN ISLANDS

Whether you're racing or relaxing, this classic Caribbean destination has it covered

certain British entrepreneur may have put the British Virgin Islands on the luxury travel map, but sailors know the archipelago's attractions extend far beyond Sir Richard Branson's Necker Island. These charming isles are home to reef-lined beaches, gin-clear waters and the finest cruising grounds in the Caribbean.

The BVIs have long been a favorite of those who like a dash of sportiness with their cruising – whether it be scuba diving or epic sailboat racing. They are family friendly and a party spot in equal measure.

What's most enticing is that it seems no matter how many times you visit, there is always something new to discover. But there are some tried and tested haunts that never go out of fashion, such as meandering through the beautiful natural rock formation of the Baths on Virgin Gorda. This itinerary balances adrenaline-fueled activities with picturesque anchorages and the odd rum cocktail thrown in for good measure.

The BVIs are undeniably one of the favorite charter destinations in the Caribbean, so it was terribly sad to see the islands battered by hurricanes in 2017. Fortunately, the repair efforts started immediately and the islands are eager to welcome guests again. Lovers of the BVIs can support the locals by visiting and helping the islands and their economy flourish all the more.







Day 1 ▶ Guana Island

Meet your yacht in a secluded anchorage in White Bay, in front of a white sand beach on the 850 acre private Guana Island. There are several great snorkeling options nearby in crystal clear water – with small colorful coral patches in shallower depths, making it an ideal place for beginners. Enjoy sundowner cocktails on the yacht and dinner overlooking this gorgeous setting.

Day 2 ▶ Norman Island

The stunning coastal trip to Norman Island, passing between Great Camanoe and Beef Island, normally takes one to two hours and there are several good lunch spots along the way. Explore the many excellent dive sites off neighboring Pelican Island, as well as the Indians, another top diving spot found just outside the Bight anchorage. Afterwards, tender to Willy T to take in the sunset - the famed pirate ship bar is being rebuilt to be "better than ever" post Irma.





Day 3 ▶ Peter Island

Early in the morning, the yacht will head to Peter Island Resort & Spa, a secure marina nestled inside Sprat Bay. Guests can take advantage of the resort's outstanding spa facilities and three pristine private beaches. In the evening, dine on fresh cuisine prepared on board, or go ashore to dine at one of Peter Island's excellent restaurants.

Day 4 ▶ Virgin Gorda

Head to the Baths – granite boulders that form sheltered sea pools on the beach – for a gourmet barbecue lunch. Go on a short hike up the sands to take in an amazing bird's eye view. Then go on a sunset cruise into Gorda Sound.

Day 5 ▶ Virgin Gorda

The protected anchorage of Gorda Sound has much to keep guests busy, from bars and restaurants to watersports spots and private beaches. Hiking, sailing lessons and kiteboarding sessions are also on offer.

Day 6 ▶ Jost Van Dyke

The yacht will make its way to the island of Jost Van Dyke. If



the weather is settled, there is a phenomenal dive site on nearby Mercurius Rock. The island is renown for its lively nightlife, too – start at Soggy Dollar Bar, then dance the night away to live music at Foxy's, both of which have been re-opened!

Day 7 ► Marina Cay

Guests who rise early have time for one final excursion to Marina Cay for one more last-minute BVI beach trip. Once everyone is awake, the yacht will make her way back to Beef Island before tendering guests to Trellis Bay for departure.



THE LEEWARD ISLANDS


Chart a course to discover these Caribbean favorites that never go out of style


ocated in the northeast of the Caribbean, between Puerto Rico and Dominica, the Leeward Islands present a beguiling range of destinations. Each one is markedly different, yet their close proximity and generally calm waters make for easy and relaxed cruising grounds.

This variety and comfort means this is one of the most popular cruising grounds in the world, no doubt helped that one of the prime Leeward ports of call is the super-stylish island of St. Barths, which is a charter mainstay. Those who want a spot quayside in the capital, Gustavia, for New Year's Eve – one of the best places in the world to ring in the New Year – or during the St. Barths Bucket superyacht regatta better make their reservations well in advance.

The Leeward Islands are made up of Anguilla, St. Martin, St. Barths, historic Antigua, lush St. Kitts and Nevis, Montserrat and Guadeloupe. This seven-day itinerary takes you on a whirlwind, non-stop action tour where one day you will find yourself on the top of Shirley Heights overlooking Nelson's Dockyard in Antigua and the next you are meandering around the waters surrounding St. Kitts and Nevis.

It is the perfect mix for those wanting to sample what the Caribbean has to offer, from its flashy to its natural side. You'd be unlikely to find a better Caribbean primer if you tried.







Day 1 ▶ St. Maarten/St. Martin

Divided by Dutch and French claimants, the island of St. Maarten/St. Martin has numerous supervacht marinas and inbound international flights, making it the logical place to start a charter in the Leeward Islands. After settling in on board, head over to Orient Bay on the northeast of the island (in the French half). one the best beaches in the Caribbean. At Sunset Bar and Grill (in the Dutch southwest). you can watch incoming planes skim over the beach as they land, then return to the yacht to see what the chef has prepared for dinner.

Day 2 ▶ Anguilla

After a leisurely breakfast, make a short hop north to Anguilla and be there in plenty of time for lunch. Drop the anchor in Sandy Ground and visit Scilly Cay, a restaurant on a tiny cay in the middle of Island Harbour Bay that specializes in lobster. Write off the rest of the afternoon as you drink rum cocktails and eat delicious barbecued lobster on a tiny island with white sandy beaches and palm trees. Can it really get any better than this?

Day 3 ► Anguilla to St. Barths

Time for exclusive French chic in St. Barths, where the rich and famous have vacationed for eons. The main port of Gustavia has excellent shopping, from Cartier to Chanel, lining the quayside where the superyachts moor. Stroll, shop and relax in cafes, but don't forget the island's natural beauty – take a lap in the tender, stopping at any of

the 32 gorgeous beaches. Then book a table at Eden Rock or Bonito for a special dinner.




Head for Antigua, settling in with a good book as the inky blue Caribbean Sea slips beneath your yacht. Arrive in time for lunch and spend the afternoon exploring Nelson's Dockyard on foot or take a walk to Fort Berkeley, with its great views. In the evening, sit out on deck with a large rum cocktail.

Day 5 ► Antigua

Take the tender out to explore Antigua. Beach-hop along the south coast's beautiful, white-sand beaches. With 365 to choose from, you are spoilt for choice and despite the popularity of yacht charters in Antigua you can still find secluded anchorages. Have a car take you up to Shirley Heights, where you see the most spectacular sunsets.

Day 6 ► Antigua to St. Kitts and Nevis

After breakfast, make for the amazingly lush islands of St. Kitts and Nevis. If you want to



see the Caribbean as it used to be, this is where to look. There is no duty-free shopping center, just a sleepy Caribbean island that hasn't changed much in 50 years – the one exception being the new Christophe Harbour marina, which is helping draw more superyachts. There's plenty to do here though, from volcano hikes to scuba diving. Have a sundowner at SALT Plage bar at Christophe Harbour, and dine on board.

Day 7 ▶ St. Kitts to St. Martin Cruise to St. Martin and before

catching that flight home, spend a few hours playing with the toys or do some serious duty-free shopping to end your carefree Caribbean vacation.





Rustic, untouched Caribbean beauty – and some of the best chocolate on the planet!

ith landscapes clothed in dense rainforest and waters teeming with a rainbow of fish and gigantic green turtles, the chain of islands that makes up the Lesser Antilles offers some of the best cruising in the Caribbean for those seeking the solitude of nature.

The Lesser Antilles is long arc of islands running north to south, from the Virgin Islands to Grenada. This itinerary, exploring the southern end of the island chain, comprises a relaxed route that takes in St. Lucia's major landmarks, the unspoiled beauty of the Grenadines and the buzz of the spice island of Grenada – which is thankfully also known for its chocolate!

St. Lucia and the Grenadines offer guests rustic Caribbean beauty. This is where you can hike to beautiful waterfalls, drop the hook in empty anchorages, walk white sand beaches and find that thatched hut beach bar that seems a million miles from your everyday worries. It's the Caribbean the way it used to be.

Starting in St. Lucia, famed for its twin Pitons mountains and regarded as one of the most beautiful and romantic islands in the Caribbean, this route then winds down through more desolate, smaller cays – such as Mayreau, home to fewer than 300 people and picture-postcard beauty. This itinerary gives guests much to explore and a feeling of reconnecting with natural beauty all along the way.







Day 1 ▶ St. Lucia

Take a helicopter shuttle from Hewanorra international airport to George F. L. Charles Airport, followed by a short taxi ride to the Capella Marina in the naturally sheltered Marigot Bay. Enjoy a champagne reception once on board before departing for a one-hour sunset cruise to Rodney Bay and dinner on your yacht, soaking up the beautiful surroundings.

Day 2 ▶ St. Lucia

Cruise in the early morning to the Pitons, St. Lucia's towering, spellbindingly beautiful twin peaks. The scenic route along St. Lucia's lush mountainous shoreline will take roughly two hours. Have lunch on the Celestial Terrace at Jade Mountain Resort. Here you can enjoy freshly caught snapper or swordfish served with vegetables grown on the estate, while gazing across at the impressive peaks of the Pitons. Divers can check out the Superman's Flight dive site, at the base of Petit Piton, for a chance to spot moray eels, seahorses and vivid coral.

Day 3 ▶ St. Lucia to St. Vincent

Travel overnight to St. Vincent and wake up in Cumberland Bay, where you can dive and snorkel directly off the yacht. For film fans, the next bay down, Wallilabou, was used as a set for *Pirates of the Caribbean*. On shore, the beautiful 59ft high Dark View Falls is a short taxi ride away.

Day 4 ▶ St. Vincent to Mayreau


Wake up in Salt Whistle Bay, Mayreau, where two pristine



half-moon beaches face each other. This spot is a Caribbean postcard come to life. Enjoy a day of watersports off the beach followed by sundowners. After an active day, indulge in a seven-course food and wine pairing experience on board, your chef creating a meal to meet your exact tastes.

Day 5 ► Mayreau to Canouan

As the sun rises, the yacht will wind her way to Canouan and anchor in the crystal-clear waters of Charlestown Bay. Golfers can play 18 holes at the Pink Sands Club Golf Course, designed by Jim Fazio. It is considered one of the top courses in the Caribbean. Afterwards, Tamarind Beach Hotel is a laid-back lunch spot; quests can relax with their





Spend the day in Tobago Cays, where the crew will set up sunlounging furniture on the beach on the island of Petit Rameau. The Tobago Cays Marine Park encompasses the five cays and is a protected turtle feeding ground. You can

get up close and swim with the turtles, or take a paddleboard and watch them glide effortlessly beneath you.

Day 7 ▶ Grenada

Make the journey overnight to Grenada and moor in the chic Port Louis Marina. If possible, extend your trip and stay a few days longer here to enjoy what the "Spice Island" has to offer. This includes bartering at St. George's Market, held on Saturdays, or explore the tropical rainforests of Grand Etang National Park. Chocolate lovers will enjoy a tour of the Grenada Chocolate Company's factory in the hills, where you can see cocoa being cultivated and buy delicious, locally made chocolate. When you've had your fill of the island, depart from Maurice Bishop international airport.



SLAND

Bask in the southern Caribbean sun while cruising a trifecta of unique Dutch islands

o you know your ABCs? That's the islands of Aruba, Bonaire and Curaçao, of course. These delightful Dutch islands blend European-style towns with brilliant blue waters, epic diving and unique desert-like landscapes where cactus-covered hills meet white sand beaches. Perhaps best of all, these southern Caribbean islands are set outside the hurricane belt, making them safe from the ravages of the storm season.

Aruba and Curaçao are two of the four countries that make up the Kingdom of the Netherlands - the Netherlands itself and the Caribbean island of Sint Maarten being the other two - while Bonaire is a special municipality of the Netherlands.

Dutch heritage is easy to see in the ABCs, no more so than in the Curaçao capital of Willemstad, with its rows of narrow houses that look much like those lining the canals in Amsterdam – only these are painted bright Caribbean colors, from yellow to blue and pink.

Begin your tour of the ABCs in Bonaire, then continue to Curaçao and on to Aruba, along the way taking in all the sights that these islands have to offer both above and below the water. There is excellent diving, some scenic anchorages, historic towns, duty-free shopping, casinos and golf courses ashore and quiet beaches to claim as your own. You'll know your ABCs pretty well after this seven-day jaunt.







Day 1 & 2 ▶ Bonaire

Bonaire is such a frontrunner in nature preservation that its entire coastline has been a protected area since 1979. As a result, the coral reefs are in excellent condition and the island is regarded as one of the top diving and snorkeling destinations in the world. No anchoring is permitted, so you'll meet your yacht in Harbour Village Marina. Pristine white sand beaches are just minutes away, where you'll find excellent snorkeling and kayaking. You'll spend two nights relaxing in Bonaire, providing plenty of time to take it all in.

Day 3 ▶ Bonaire to Klein, Curação

From Bonaire, the yacht will cruise 25 miles to the tiny island of Klein off the southern tip of Curaçao. Klein is an uninhabited island with an ancient lighthouse that begs to be explored. Divers will enjoy the stunning coral formations, a vertical drop-off and underwater caves. Or head inland and hike five miles around the coast of the island. After a full day in this peaceful outpost, enjoy dinner prepared by your personal chef on board.

Day 4 ► Spanish Waters, Curação

Your yacht will weave her way up a narrow inlet into the protected bay called Spanish Waters. One of the most sheltered anchorages in the Caribbean, you are assured a very calm night here in any weather. It's the perfect place for watersports as well, and there are many small bays and



inlets to explore. A number of top rated beaches are nearby, or go ashore to play tennis or golf at the Santa Barbara course. Enjoy dinner afterwards at the Shore seafood grill, overlooking the coastline.

Day 5 ▶ Willemstad, Curaçao

Dutch heritage is clear here, with the tall, colorful waterfront buildings that are straight out of Amsterdam. The town's history is kept alive in many museums and historic buildings, such as the Kura Hulanda slavery museum and the Mikvé Israel-Emanuel Synagogue, the oldest synagogue in the Western hemisphere. There is excellent shopping in Punda. Here you will find duty-free jewelry shops such as Little Switzerland and Little Holland, as well as clothing boutiques and electronic stores. There are also excellent gourmet restaurants to enjoy. After enjoying a dinner ashore, your yacht will leave the dock for an overnight cruise to Aruba as you sleep soundly.

Day 6 ▶ Eagle Beach, Aruba

Arrive in Aruba to gorgeous views of the mile-long stretch of white sand known as Eagle Beach, anchoring in front of the





Tropicana Casino. You might spend time enjoying sparkling, turquoise waters here, or head ashore to wander the lively streets of Aruba. Perhaps at night you could try your hand in the casino, or dine in one of the island's excellent restaurants.

Day 7 ► Aruba

This is a good day to take an island tour of Aruba. With its impressive volcanic rock formations, gold mill ruins and remote chapels overlooking the sea, there are many sights to take in. A Jeep Wrangler or Land Rover can even be arranged to enliven the experience, which will take you over the island's unique desert landscape. After an exciting day exploring on shore, return to the comfort of your yacht, and enjoy one last dinner on board.

Day 8 ▶ Aruba

A 20 minute cruise will take us to our final destination at the main port of Oranjestad, which has been the capital of Aruba since 1796. From here it is a short trip to the airport. As your time in the ABCs comes to a close, you can be sure that you've sampled some of the most varied and interesting islands in the Caribbean.



GALÁPAGOS ISLANDS

The No 1 bucket list destination for wildlife enthusiasts will wow you as much as it did Darwin

solated some 500 miles west of Ecuador, right on the Equator, the Galápagos Islands were made famous by Charles Darwin, the English naturalist who visited in the 1830s and came away with the basis of evolution.

The best way to see the islands is still Darwin's way – living aboard a boat and going ashore to sample the remarkable wildlife.

Though the charter yachts that take you there today will seem a lot more glamorous than Darwin's sloop, *Beagle*, the friendliness of the wildlife has hardly changed. You can swim with sea lions, scuba dive with hammerhead sharks, hike over islands spotting bluefooted boobies and albatross doing their signature mating dance or watch as giant tortoises lay their eggs in the sand. These animals are blissfully unafraid of humans.

Although a luxury yacht charter in the Galápagos, or cruising on a private yacht, comes with specific restrictions, with the government dictating specific routes, the volcanic archipelago still offers some of the most enchanting cruising waters in the world. With unique wildlife and numerous bucket list dives the Galápagos reward the adventurous with a once in a lifetime superyacht experience.

This suggested itinerary, just an example, explores the eastern side of the archipelago allowing to experience the best of what the Galápagos Islands have to offer.







Day 1 ▶ Santa Cruz

Start your Galápagos adventure by visiting the highlands of Santa Cruz. The lush vegetation on the island attracts a host of exciting birds and provides visitors with a rare opportunity to see giant Galápagos tortoises in their natural habitat. In the afternoon, you can visit the Charles Darwin Research Station and Galápagos National Park headquarters. After a day of roaming Santa Cruz. it's time to meet your yacht and enjoy a lovely dinner on board.

Day 2 ⊳ Española & Punta Suarez

After cruising overnight, you will awake in the morning off Española Island. It is one of the oldest islands, thought to be about four million years old, and is renowned for the variety and quantity of its wildlife. The island has a number of endemic species including the Española mockingbird, lava lizard, and waved albatross. In the afternoon, visit Punta Suarez, famed for its albatross breeding colony. The birds, which mate for life, can be observed between mid-April and November performing an intriguing mating dance that can last for several days.

Day 3 ▶ San Cristóbal & Kicker Rock

Today, you'll awake off San Cristóbal, the island where Darwin first went ashore. Head for Punta Pitt, which is the only place where you can see all three species of boobies: blue-footed, red-footed and Nazca. In the afternoon, take a short ride in the tender



to Kicker Rock, which offers fantastic snorkeling and is one of the best places in the world to swim with sharks. Watch the stunning sunset against the orange rock formation.

Day 4 ▶ Santa Fé & South Plaza

Arrive at Santa Fé Island, also known as Barrington Island after the British admiral, Samuel Barrington. Its white sand beaches are normally covered with sea lions, and the island is also famous for its land iguanas. Go kayaking or snorkeling in the turquoise waters, which are packed with a variety of fish, including eels and rays, as well as urchins. In the afternoon, visit the small



island of South Plaza, which has one of the biggest sea lion colonies in the archipelago.

Day 5 ▶ Genovesa & Prince Philip's Steps

The next morning your yacht will arrive at the horseshoeshaped Genovesa Island.
Disembark at Darwin Bay Beach on to a small sand and coral beach and follow a short trail along a tidal lagoon for stunning views. In the afternoon, visit Prince Philip's Steps, a natural stairway in the rocks named after the British Royal who visited in 1965 and 1981.

Day 6 ▶ Santiago & Bartolomé Islands

The penultimate day will be

spent taking in the islands of Santiago and Bartolomé. Santiago is thought to be the second island visited by Darwin and is now one of the most popular tourist sites. You can start your day at Sullivan Bay, which will allow you to walk across recent lava flow. In the afternoon, visit Pinnacle Rock, which juts out from Bartolomé's northern bay. Then either climb the trail to the top of the island to take in the stunning views or you can snorkel in the bay, enjoying a rare opportunity to swim with penguins.

Day 7 ► Rábida Island

On the final day of your adventure you can visit the islands of Rábida and Sombrero Chino. You will land at Red Beach, which is famous for its wading birds and ghost crabs. Behind the beach there is a saltwater lagoon that, at certain times of the year, will allow you to spot feeding and breeding flamingos. After lunch, visit the tiny Sombrero Chino island. On shore you can land at a small white sand beach before walking along a 400 metre trail, which allows you to see several kinds of lava. Then head back on board for one more dinner before disembarking at Baltra Island the next morning.

This itinerary examines Northern Patagonia, the entry point to this amazing world, filled with countless islands, channels, inlets, coves, and imposing glaciers. The Torres del Paine National Park is filled with all of these wonders, and guests can experience close encounters with whales, dolphins and penguins.

This is a world of stunning beauty with the imposing backdrop of the Andes as your constant companion. A charter in Patagonia is an experience that will leave you in awe.







Day 1 ▶ Puerto Montt

Meet your yacht in Puerto
Montt, at the Oxxean Marina.
From here you'll begin a cruise
south to enter the Comau Fjord,
a beautiful 22 mile long inlet.
At its end lies Caleta Porcelana,
where a hot stream flowing in
the forest creates natural pools
of water. This anchorage is an
ideal spot for some kayaking
or paddleboarding, or take off
in the yacht's helicopter for
some sightseeing from above.

Day 2 ▶ Isla Mechuque

Enjoy breakfast as the yacht cruises towards Isla Mechuque, a small but stunning island. There are two museums and the famous wooden-stilt houses. Go ashore for lunch or dinner to try the famous curanto al hoyo (seafood cooked in a ground pit with hot stones and leaves).

Day 3 ► Caleta Gonzalo

Cruising southeast, you'll arrive at Pumalín Park nature reserve. From a trailhead near Café Caleta Gonzalo, the Cascada climbs and winds through thick rainforest to a high falls. Guests can also visit apiaries that produce delicious Patagonian honey and there are many places for fishing. Overnight, your yacht will make its way to Bahía Pumalín.

Day 4 ▶ Cailiín Island

From Bahía Pumalín, your captain will navigate southwest towards the southern part of Chiloé Island and arrive at Cailín Island, a small group of three picturesque islands. Charles Darwin visited Cailín Island during his trip around the world and mentioned the island in his



books as Caylen. Head ashore to explore, returning to the yacht for an epic meal created by your chef.

Day 5 ▶ Melinka

As you weave southwards into the Archipelago de los Chonos, you'll discover an extraordinary system of islands and channels that create a natural labyrinth of extreme beauty. Winds from the Pacific leave the westernmost islands rugged and barren, but a thick forest regains the land further east. You can see humpback whales nearby, as well as penguins, dolphins and sea lions.

Day 6 ▶ Puyuhuapi

Time for a little pampering on shore. This quaint seaside village is the gateway to Queulat National Park and Puyuhuapi Lodge and Spa, a prestigious hot-springs resort accessible only by boat. Take some time to enjoy the natural hot spring pools, overlooking your yacht in the deep harbor below, book in for a massage at the spa or simply enjoy dinner at the lodge's restaurant.

Day 7 ▶ Caleta Christiane

Today, you'll follow a route through a maze of islands to the

eastern side of Isla Traiguén, with stunning views of the Andes, ancient volcanoes and waterfalls. The area offers many safe anchorages and areas for kayaking or trekking onshore. At Caleta Christiane a river from nearby Lago Tronador flows into the bay as a waterfall in a beautiful forest setting. You can enjoy a peaceful dinner here – and you'll never see so many stars.

Day 8 ▶ San Rafael

Cruise to one of the highlights of Northern Patagonia - the San Rafael Glacier, which is the northernmost tidewater glacier in the southern hemisphere. It is part of the Patagonian Icecap, which is 18 to 50 miles wide and has elevations between 5,900 to 9,850 feet, running along the Chile-Argentina border. On sunny days the view is breathtaking, as the glacier sits in the middle of a green lake surrounded by high mountains. The yacht will cruise overnight northwards.

Day 9 ▶ Puerto Chacabuco

Your last day on the water won't disappoint as you take in majestic views of snowy peaks before arriving in the small port of Puerto Chacabuco where you'll transfer to the airport.



Take the plunge and head for the most dramatic adventure destination on Earth

ith a surge in the number of rugged explorer yachts being built, voyages to remote destinations are becoming increasingly popular. This is especially true of the far-flung southern continent of Antarctica, which has just recorded its busiest superyacht season ever. One of the most incredible destinations in the world, there is simply no shortage of amazing spectacles to see here.

Antarctica is an amazing cruising destination for those seeking an adventurous experience, but one with all the trappings of luxury afforded by your charter yacht.

From Cape Horn, it's just a few days' sailing or a short flight over to the Antarctic Peninsula, where your yacht will be immediately surrounded by beautiful snowy scenery. This is your chance to see majestic glaciers, imposing icebergs and penguin colonies while cruising through waters few people have ever visited.

The landscape, the scale of your surroundings and the depth and clarity of the light make the whole experience unforgettable for visitors.

Antarctica is a land of extremes – and it's certainly a challenging cruising ground – but this is what makes it the ideal destination to visit by superyacht. After a day out in the snow, return to the yacht that might be equipped with a sauna or a steam shower where you can warm up and unwind, and be pampered by your doting crew and chef. Extreme cruising and extreme luxury all in one.









Day 1 ▶ Punta Arenas to King George Island

Save time by flying from Punta Arenas, Chile, to meet the yacht, and avoid a cruise across the Drake Passage, which is known to have some of the roughest seas in the world. This is one of the most exclusive trans-continental flights, landing at Chile's Base Presidente Eduardo Frei Montalva. Russia's Bellingshausen base is nearby, and you may have the chance for a quick visit. Transfer to the waterfront where tenders will take you to your luxury yacht.

Day 2 ▶ Antarctic Sound

Get the camera ready! Known as Iceberg Alley, Antarctic Sound is at the northeastern point of the Antarctic Peninsula, where large tabular icebergs drift north from the Weddell Sea. You may land and visit Adélie penguin colonies at Paulet Island, Brown Bluff, Devil Island. or elsewhere in the area.

Day 3 & 4 ▶ The Danco Coast & Gerlache Strait

On the western side of the Antarctic Peninsula, spend





offer amazing experiences. Day 5 ▶ Antarctic Circle

Island, Booth Island, Pléneau

Island and the Penola Strait.

The choices are many, but all

If sea-ice conditions and time permit, you may venture still further south on the western side of the peninsula, towards the Antarctic Circle. If you are able to make your way through the pack ice and into Crystal Sound you may cross the Antarctic Circle at 66°33'S. Landing at the deserted British base on nearby Detaille Island is a step back in time. It was occupied from 1956 to 1959 but remains as it was when the British scientists left, frozen in time as it were.



Day 6 ▶ Port Lockroy

Sail north to continue your exploration of the Danco Coast. You may visit Port Lockroy, home to an abandoned British naval base-turned museum, and Cuverville Island, home to the largest gentoo penguin colony on the peninsula.

Day 7 ▶ King George Island to Punta Arenas

Arrive off King George Island in time for your return flight north to Punta Arenas. Weather permitting, arrive in Punta Arenas in the afternoon for onward travel.





Head north for cruising that combines beauty, activity, fine food – and glorious peace



For those who prefer to watch the world go by from the deck of a yacht, Norway is a shrewd option as its beauty is laid out before you along its majestic fjords – or you can hop in a helicopter for a bird's eye view.

Many a night is spent in secluded anchorages that you will have all to yourself. It's not all about the quiet life, however, as the cities of Stavanger and Bergen offer plenty of shopping, dining and nightlife.

And foodies will rejoice at the amazingly fresh seafood on offer. Cornelius is a perfect example of what's on offer: a renowned seafood restaurant on the water on Holmen Island in the archipelago off Bergen.

These enticing northerly cruising grounds of Norway combine adventurous pursuits, beautiful scenery and sumptuous solitude. You may never return to the Med.







Day 1 ▶ Stavanger to Lysefjord

Meet your yacht in Stavanger and wander the town's boutiques and shops before departing on your fjord adventure. Sip a welcome cocktail while soaking up your first taste of Norway's stunning scenery. Visit the island of Hidle, a popular tourist spot in the fjords, where you can enjoy dinner before cruising to a secluded overnight anchorage.

Day 2 ➤ Pulpit Rock & Haugesund

A healthy breakfast on board will energize you for a hike up to Norway's famous Pulpit Rock. Perfect for active cruisers, this beautiful walk takes about three and a half hours, and you'll be rewarded with some incredible views. Back on board, settle in for lunch en route to Haugesund. History buffs will enjoy a guided tour of the Viking Farm at Avaldsnes. Alternatively, this would be the perfect time to enjoy a spot of fishing before cruising to a quiet anchorage.

Day 3 ► Akrafjorden to Rosendal

Take an early morning cruise to Akrafjorden. Families traveling with kids may choose to visit the Trolljuv Adrenalin Park where the adventurous can zip line across the Trolljuv Gorge and bungee jump from the bridge. Back on board, ask the captain to position the yacht so you can get some photos of the Langfoss waterfall, which drops a total of 2,008 feet in all. Then enjoy lunch underway while you cruise to a peaceful anchorage at Rosendal.

Day 4 ▶ Rosendal to Lofthus

Cruise to Norheimsund to visit the Steinsdalsfossen waterfall, then on to the port of Lofthus, where you'll stay overnight. This scenic passage goes via the Kalrassen waterfall, where you can get close enough to fill a glass of water from the yacht. At Lofthus, disembark for a private dining experience in the wine crypt at the Hotel Ullensvang.

Day 5 ▶ Lofthus to Eidfjord

Before setting off this morning, take advantage of the helipad at the Hotel Ullensvang and charter a flight for spectacular views over the Folgefonna Glacier and the Trolltunga viewpoint. Get a little closer with the Trolltunga Zippen a 2,000ft zip line that will take you down 650ft to the lake below. Then unwind while you cruise to the overnight anchorage at Eidfjord. One of the main sights is the famous Voringsfossen waterfall - best enjoyed from the deck with sundowner cocktails.



Day 6 ► Eidfjord to Tysnesoy

Thrill-seekers should take advantage of the many high-octane activities on offer in Eidfjord. A downhill cycle through the Hardangervidda National Park is sure to get hearts racing while the unique White Water Jump combines



abseiling, zip lining and aerial acrobatics – all over a gushing river. The yacht will go on to an anchorage off Tysnesoy island.



Take a last opportunity to play with your yacht's water toys, enjoy some fishing or make a foodie visit to a local salmon farm. In the afternoon, cruise to the city of Bergen, bursting with great shopping and nightlife, before heading home.



Fun in the sun by day, parties by night – these Spanish isles offer something for every mood





Nearby Menorca is small in size but big in beauty. The entire island falls under UNESCO Biosphere protection and this care is seen in the spellbinding marine reserves, untouched beaches and the preservation of buildings.

Further along the island chain, Ibiza and Formentera are like ying and yang; Ibiza is always ready to party, while Formentera knows how to slow down, with its hippy chic vibe. Ibiza, however, is now making a name for itself as a wellness hub with yoga retreats.

The Balearics present the perfect place to relax or exercise, party or unwind - everything you could want in one sunny spot.







Day 1 ▶ Palma to Cabrera Island

Arrive in Palma and take time to walk the winding streets of the Old Town. Sample tapas or paella and a local beer, or dine by the water's edge at the Sea Club, found in the awe-inspiring Cap Rocat fortress. Cruise across to the nature reserve island of Cabrera. Spend the night moored in the national park's sheltered bay.

Day 2 ► Cabrera Island to Ibiza Town

Stroll through the cobbled streets of Ibiza Old Town before sunset drinks in the harbor. There are many sophisticated bars in the Old Town and along the harbor. Book at Lio Ibiza for an unforgettable cabaret show.

Day 3 ► Ibiza Town to Formentera



Day 5 ► Es Vedrà to Andratx, Mallorca

Depart Ibiza early and cruise back across to Mallorca for



Day 6 ► Andratx to Port de Sóller

Anchor in the circular bay of Port de Sóller and head inland to the mountain town of Sóller. Dominated by a 16th century church, the cobbled streets are bustling with cafes and restaurants. Nearby is the charming village of Deià that is home to the famous La Residencia hotel. Enjoy dinner on board the yacht tonight.

Day 7 ▶ Port de Sóller to Pollensa

The peaceful coves around Formentor and Pollensa are perfect for a quiet anchorage. Spend the day enjoying watersports or step ashore for a round of golf or a bike ride or hike, taking in the beautiful vistas of the coastline.



Day 8 ► Pollensa to Cala Morell. Menorca

Sail across to the quieter island of Menorca. Spend the day relaxing and swimming in the clear waters around the white sandy beaches of Cala Algayarens and Cala Morell.

Day 9 ► Cala Morell to Palma, Mallorca

Awake at anchor off Puerto Portals. Spend the morning exploring the bustling port then cruise around to Palma and have a last chance to explore and shop in the Old Town.

But it's not just a party spot; there are many opportunities to relax and take in the natural beauty of the South of France as well.

From Monaco to Saint-Tropez, the French Riviera comprises the world famous resort towns of Cap d'Ail, Beaulieu-sur-Mer, Antibes, Cannes, Nice and Juan-les-Pins, to name a few. This is a yachting mecca, where many of the world's biggest and best private yachts spend their summer holidays. As a result, it's long been one of the most popular areas for superyacht charters.

Plan your trip to coincide with one of the mega-events taking place on the French Riviera in May, such as the celebrity studded Cannes Film Festival or the high-octane Monaco Grand Prix, watching the F1 race from the deck of your yacht. No matter what time of year, there is something for every taste happening in the principality of Monaco.









Day 1 ▶ Monaco

An eight-minute helicopter ride takes you from Nice airport to your yacht in Monaco. Settle in with cocktails before going ashore to try your hand at the roulette table at the legendary Casino de Monte-Carlo. You may prefer to visit the Buddha Bar, all velvet drapery and exotic opulence, or head for Jimmy'z nightclub for the top DJs, or Black Legend jazz club for live music.

Day 2 ▶ Cannes via Antibes


Take a leisurely cruise to Cap d'Antibes, berthing in Port Vauban, overlooked by an ancient citadel. Lunch on the sea-edge terrace at the Hotel du Cap-Eden-Roc, and afterwards visit the Musée Picasso, housed in Château Grimaldi. Cannes is the next port of call, where you can indulge in a bit of retail therapy. Take the short drive out of town to the verdant, two Michelin starred L'Oasis, partaking in the delectable fusion of Med and Asian cuisine.

Day 3 ▶ Iles de Lérins

Cruise past red-roofed villas spilling down the hillsides to lles de Lérins, a cluster of four quiet islands near Cannes. Stop off at Sainte Marguerite and, for lunch, avoid the island's restaurants and instead go for a swim and a gourmet picnic.

Day 4 ▶ Saint-Tropez

An early morning departure will have you breakfasting on board as the former fishing village of Saint-Tropez comes into view. Anchor off Pampelonne Beach, synonymous with Brigitte Bardot and said to





Leaving the glitz and glamour far behind, head across the Gulf of Hyères to Porquerolles, a protected, tranquil island where cars are banned. Tender ashore to Notre-Dame beach for a lazy morning on the sands. After a picnic lunch, cycle through cool forests of parasol pines and traditional villages. Dine at the Michelin-starred L'Olivier restaurant.

Day 6 ► Villefranche-sur-Mer

Get under way early for the cruise to Villefranche-sur-Mer, and lunch on board with a picturesque view of the pastel-hued buildings of this ancient port. A tender ride will deliver you to the quayside. Meander up through the maze of narrow streets of this 14th century town, which is guarded by the imposing Fort Saint-Elme.



Day 7 ▶ St-Jean-Cap-Ferrat

St-Jean-Cap-Ferrat offers two pretty anchorages where you can laze on board. Take the tender into the Paloma Beach Club for a long, relaxing lunch, and then consider visiting the Grand-Hotel du Cap-Ferrat and its renowned Le Spa. Afterwards, enjoy a quiet dinner on board.

Day 8 ► Monaco

Breakfast on board as you cruise back to Monaco, where you could spend the day having a spa treatment or trying on some diamonds at the Graff boutique - a perfect souvenir and the perfect end to your French Riviera sojourn.



CORSICA & SARDINIA

These French and Italian isles make a perfect match in this gorgeous Med itinerary

he major islands of Corsica and Sardinia sit together, north to south, in the Mediterranean. One is held by France, one by Italy, and a cruise to them both will delight the senses – both offer excellent sailing, diving and diversions on shore in historic villages.

Though Corsica, the smaller and more northerly of the two, is the French island, it is actually much closer to Italy, and as such has a unique fusion of the two cultures and styles. For instance, it has its own language, which is very different to French, and a strong nationalist tradition.

The island is marked by granite mountains, with the historic capital of Corte set in the middle of them, while the southern end that borders Sardinia is defined by a multitude of small islands and coves. Here you will find the La Maddalena archipelago, which is one of the best cruising grounds in the entire Mediterranean.

Further south in Sardinia, superyachts flock to the chic Porto Cervo and the excellent sailing grounds found right offshore. But there is much to see in the rest of this Italian island, where you can get away from crowds and find peaceful harbors and wild, windswept shores.

Why choose one island when you can try both? This itinerary takes you through the best of both worlds that is Corsica and Sardinia – better brush up on that French and Italian, too!









Day 1 ► Porto-Vecchio to the Lavezzi islands

Meet your yacht in Porto-Vecchio in Corsica. This quaint town is rich in history and is overlooked by an ancient fort. Take time to explore before boarding your yacht for a cruise to the Lavezzi islands off the south coast of Corsica. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, these uninhabited islands are set in the Strait of Bonifacio between Corsica and Sardinia. Reachable only by vacht, you can enjoy some time away from the crowds exploring the granite boulder islands and diving the majestic reefs. Tuck into a protected anchorage for dinner on board.

Day 2 ▶ Lavezzi islands to Bonifacio

Awake in these picturesque islands and enjoy breakfast on the aft deck before cruising to Bonifacio, a wonderful natural port. This Corsican town is especially beautiful for its setting between two white-washed bluffs. Houses perched atop the cliffs overlook the clear waters. Hike up to the walled city and explore the narrow streets and alleys, taking time to stop in a cafe. Spend the afternoon relaxing on your yacht, then in the evening, after sundowners on board, head ashore for dinner.

Day 3 ► La Maddalena

It's time to set sail for Sardinia, heading first to the La Maddalena archipelago, all of which is protected as a natural park. This group of islands is so lovely that it's surprising more people don't know about them – but it's for your benefit. Here



you'll find pink-sand beaches, blue-green waters and steep cliffs rising from the sea. It all creates an epic setting. Settle in for a picnic on a pink beach, or take to the town of Cala Gavetta for an evening stroll.

Day 4 ▶ Porto Cervo

Your yacht will head to Porto Cervo, which lures the jet set and superyacht crowd alike. Developed by the Aga Khan in the 1960s, it is a royally beautiful spot backed by green, rolling hills. The marina is surrounded by top restaurants, shops and marine-focused stores, making it the ideal destination for a night offshore. Indulge in a wonderful meal and perhaps a night on the town.

Day 5 ► Santa Teresa Gallura

It's another beautiful day in Sardinia. Today, your yacht will cruise to the northern end of the main island, making a stop in a quiet harbor where you can enjoy breakfast, take a swim and maybe play with the water toys. Then travel on to Santa Teresa Gallura,

After indulging in the beauty and food of Sardinia, you'll enjoy a few more days in Corsica. Sail northward to Campomoro, a quiet port that is protected by an ancient Genoese tower. This is the perfect spot to burn off a few of those calories from all the indulaing with some excellent hiking and biking trails. Or play a bit more with the water toys if you haven't had enough yet. Enjoy one more night on board, having your chef make you whatever your heart desires.



Return to where it all began in Porto-Vecchio, Corsica.
Say farewell to your yacht and crew here, and take in some more shopping or another meal before heading home. The experiences of the last week will mean you'll keep this dualisland, dual-country cruise in your heart wherever you go.





Old World Italian glamour and idyllic cruising combine in one spellbinding itinerary

ristocrats have been vacationing in the Bay of Naples for thousands of years — ever since the ancient Romans escaped the hustle and bustle of their capital. This legendary Italian bay, overlooked by the volcanic peak of Mount Vesuvius, is a great starting point for experiencing the delights of the Amalfi Coast and visiting the chic destinations of Capri and Positano.

The coveted island of Capri can only be reached by boat, which makes visiting by superyacht so ideal. Take in all that Capri has to offer, with its designer boutiques and elegant cafes, and visit the most private of anchorages, then head to Positano to enjoy the city's stunning views from your own luxury yacht.

Heading west, the more remote Mediterranean islands of Ponza and Palmarola beckon with ruggedly beautiful shores, quiet bays and few tourist sites - though there are some excellent restaurants, serving up truly authentic Italian cuisine like you can find in few places.

These islands offer the perfect respite, a welcome dose of solitude in between the buzz of Capri and the big city delights of Rome – though there is still plenty to do here.

Then end the journey in Rome, making plenty of time to wander this amazing city, which is like an outdoor museum for all the historic monuments on display.









Day 1 ▶ Naples to Capri

Your journey will begin in Italy's third largest city, Naples, located at the foot of Mount Vesuvius. Meet your yacht at Sannazzaro Marina, close to Naples international airport, from where you will set sail for the Marina Grande on the isle of Capri. Whether you choose to dine on board or on shore, the marina is just a short stroll from the winding streets full of high class shops and boutiques. La Piazzetta is the centre of attention for the many international jet setters who visit the island every year.

Day 2 ▶ Capri

Cruising around Capri, the benefits of traveling by yacht are apparent: you'll be able to visit parts of the island inaccessible by other means. Discover the Grotta Bianca, the Natural Arch, the Faraglioni rocks, and the bay of Marina Piccola. Enjoy the quiet glamour of this lush island.

Day 3 ▶ Positano

A short one-hour cruise back towards the mainland brings you to Positano. Known as "the Gem of the Divine Coast," Positano rises up almost vertically from the sea following the steep incline of the mountains. This may be the only place in the world where the panoramic view of the town is more beautiful than the seascape behind you (and yet another reason why a yacht is the best way to appreciate this coastline). Spend the afternoon relaxing on the sundeck or try out the yacht's water toys. Dine al fresco on board and enjoy the breathtaking views. While



you sleep your yacht will be steaming towards the remote islands of Italy's Pontine archipelago, and you will awake at anchor between Palmarola and Ponza.

Day 4 ▶ Palmarola

Palmarola is one of the most charming islands in the Mediterranean. Enjoy a leisurely cruise through the island's transparent blue waters while admiring its ruggedly handsome coastline dotted with grottoes, bays, and cliffs. The shallow crystal clear waters of Palmarola's south side are a bather's paradise and the perfect place to stop for lunch. This is a wonderful area for snorkeling and exploring caves - followed by a fabulous meal and quiet night on board.

Day 5 ▶ Ponza

Visit Ponza, the largest of the Pontine islands. It is well worth the trip. Encircled by dramatic coves and cliffs, the main town, with its colorful houses, is thought of by many visitors as a less spoilt version of Capri. The island's main settlement is Porto di Ponza, around the harbor. Compared to some Italian islands, there aren't many tourist sites or



monuments on Ponza, but there are some excellent restaurants as well as a few options for late-night drinking and dancing. Overnight, the yacht will cruise on to Rome.

Day 6 ► Rome

Get ready to spend the day in the Eternal City of Rome. The yacht will moor in Roma Marina in the port of Civitavecchia, with the backdrop of its ancient fortress setting the scene. It's a quick car ride into Rome, where you can tour the historic sites. It's also an ideal place to shop for Italian luxury items and dine at gourmet restaurants before finally heading back home, bidding Italy ciao, bella!



Explore the wild, western side of this southern Italian island steeped in ancient history

ith its rugged coastline, mountain trails and secluded grottoes, western Sicily is the gateway to a more remote Mediterranean adventure.

While some remote spots require intense efforts to reap the rewards of serenity, the Aegadian Islands off Sicily's dramatic western coast have been right under our noses all along. The islands are surprisingly easy to get to but feel worlds away from other favorite Mediterranean hotspots. Often we feel so spoilt for choice in the Med that we forget to poke beyond the well-known cruising grounds of the Italian Riviera and Côte d'Azur. But those who are enticed by nature, outdoor adventure and privacy rather than by parties and retail therapy will be amply rewarded with a meander along this stretch of coast.

There is something mythical and elusive about Sicily. It is steeped in fascinating history, both of the manmade and natural varieties, predating Mafia ties and the Hollywood movie lore. The Greek temples, smoldering Mount Etna – Europe's largest active volcano, which in 2017 reminded the world she is still kicking – are tourist sites compared with the hidden gems that our itinerary of the wild, western side of Sicily puts forth.

Set south in the Med, Sicily's season is happily stretched. Come as early as April and linger into October, and you'll still find sunny, warm days.









Day 1 ▶ Palermo

Meet your yacht in Palermo. Explore the beautiful architecture of this historic city, then enjoy dinner at the Grand Hotel Villa Igiea overlooking the Palermo Marina. The private dining room of Cuvée du Jour is the most coveted table at which you can try chef Carmelo Trentacosti's experimental take on Sicilian fare.

Day 2 ▶ Palermo to San Vito Lo Capo

Sail westward from Palermo, passing the quaint hillside town of Scopello on the way. Tender in to the famed Tonnara di Scopello, a former tuna fishery that had a starring role as a backdrop in Ocean's 12. Just beyond is the Lo Zingaro Nature Reserve, a lush park that can be accessed only by foot or boat, so it's easy to find quiet coves in which to enjoy a picnic. Enjoy dinner in San Vito Lo Capo.

Dav 3 ▶ Ustica

Take a northward detour to the island of Ustica, a wild island surrounded by amazing waters. It's known as the Black Pearl of the Mediterranean and is actually a burned out underwater volcano, with only four square miles protruding above the surface. It makes for captivating diving - from caves to a site called Cape Gavazzi, the world's first underwater archaeological museum, where remnants from Roman-era shipwrecks can be seen.

Dav 4 ► Mozia

Next, cruise south to the island of Mozia, off the far western side of Sicily. Set in the Stagnone Nature Reserve



between Trapani and Marsala. this little island has a history stretching back more than 2,700 years to when the Phoenicians built a trade outpost. Take a small boat in to visit the museum and be invited to dine with the locals.

Day 5 ► Favignana

Sail on all the way west to the wild Aegadian archipelago. The trio of islands - Favignana, Levanzo and Marettimo - are each beguiling in their own way. On Favignana, take the tender and tuck into Grotta Azzurra (after the color of the water), Grotta dei Sospiri (the grotto of sighs) and Grotta degli Innamorati (lovers' grotto), so named because of two identical rocks that stand side by side.

Day 6 - Levanzo

Arrive in the peace and quiet of Levanzo, which is the tiniest and least populated of the islands. It is a favorite among nature lovers and photographers. It's easy to feel as if you're one of the first people to have landed here but cave art found in the Grotta del Genovese will prove otherwise. Enjoy a dinner on board, basking in the thrill of solitude.



Day 7 ▶ Marettimo

The furthest west Aegadian island, Marettimo is a steep, rocky peak rising from the sea, promising myriad hiking trails and lookout points. The town of Marettimo itself is petite, with whitewashed houses and the ruins of a Spanish castle. Your yacht will head to Punta Cortiglio in the south where you can have a nice swim and fantastic snorkeling. Soak up a brilliant sunset, and enjoy your last night on board.

Day 8 ▶ Palermo

Your yacht will cruise overnight back to Palermo, so you can transition back to the real world, taking unforgettable memories of these wild western shores of Italy with you.



CROATIA & MONTENEGRO

Historic charm blends with modern development to create a new superyacht empire

or charterers looking for a departure from the tried-and-true attractions of the Western Mediterranean, the eastern Adriatic coastline has all the appeal of the classic Med destinations, but with a dash of Ottoman history – and far fewer people.

A bridge between East and West, the deep and jagged eastern coast of the Adriatic Sea has witnessed the rise and fall of empires. With its glorious beaches and sublimely charming Old World architecture, the region has much to engage the senses.

This itinerary starts you off in Montenegro, which as some have mused could be the "new Monaco" for the uptick in its luxurious properties and superyacht marinas.

Taking an early morning tender ride on the mirror-calm, stunningly beautiful Bay of Kotor makes this reason enough to visit, not to mention the beaches and exhilarating nightlife.

Then it is on to Croatia, with its 1,100 miles of rugged coastline. It's a favorite destination of charterers who seek a dash of pretty islands, good nightlife and dining and lush nature on shore.

Fabulous food, an abundance of antiquities and the friendliest people make this a winning itinerary. Add to that a climate that means it's sunnier than the South of France through the summer months, and visitors will leave wanting more – the sure sign of a successful charter holiday.











Day 1 ▶ Tivat, Montenegro

Guests are welcomed on board at Porto Montenegro in Tivat. This destination marina has many gourmet restaurants on site, a spa and an acclaimed beach club. There is also a maritime museum where you can tour a submarine. Browse the luxury shops before settling in on board your yacht for cocktails and a stunning sunset. Enjoy dinner on shore tonight in one of the restaurants in the marina.

Day 2 ▶ Tivat to Kotor

Spend the morning cruising through the Bay of Kotor, stopping to play with the water toys, and arrive in the town of Kotor in the afternoon to explore on shore. Wedged between mountains, the ancient town invites visitors to wander through its narrow streets. The entire town is a medieval maze of museums, churches, cafe-strewn squares and Venetian palaces.

Day 3 ► Kotor to Dubrovnik. Croatia

Depart Kotor and motor north towards Dubrovnik in Croatia, stopping in a harbor along the way, such as Cavtat, for lunch. Arrive in the fairytalepretty city of Dubrovnik by



late afternoon. Guests might recognize the walled city as the backdrop of *Game of Thrones*. Enjoy a private tour in town and a nice dinner in the ancient city.

Day 4 ▶ Dubrovnik to Korcula

Depart Dubrovnik bound for the island of Korcula, stopping in one of the bays on the way. There are a hundred or so bays, so plenty to choose from. By day's end you'll arrive in Korcula. This is where Marco Polo was supposedly born – and it boasts the very house it happened – but Venice claims otherwise. History buffs still will enjoy visiting the Marco Polo museum, which details the explorer's early life and exploits.

Day 5 ► Korcula to Hvar

Today, sail on from Korcula to the island of Hvar, stopping in the bay off Loviste for watersports fun. At the end of the day, you'll arrive in Hvar Town - the island's buzzy hub - framed by 13th century walls, featuring beautifully ornamental Gothic palaces and traffic-free marble streets. Take time to wander the main square and enjoy the shops but, when the crowds get too much, head over to one of the many beaches or a bay for a swim.

Hvar's reputation as Croatia's premier party town is well deserved, so after dinner head over to the famed Carpe Diem nightclub to live it up.



Enjoy the morning at the picturesque Pakleni islands, near Split, before heading off. Croatia's second largest city, Split is the ideal place to see Dalmatian life as it's really lived, perfectly balancing tradition and modernity. The Diocletian's Palace (a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the most impressive Roman monuments) is worth a visit but throughout the walled city of Split, you'll see dozens of bars, restaurants and shops thriving amid the historic atmospheric.





GREECE

Island-hopping does not get any better than among the lush green gems of the Ionian Sea

reece offers an abundance of cruising grounds. While the Cyclades islands of Mykonos and Santorini might be some of the best known, there are so many other beautiful – and less crowded – places to discover, especially when you have the luxury of traveling by private yacht.

Chart a course for the Greek Ionian islands, which stretch southwards from the Albanian coast towards the southern tip of the Peloponnese, lying off the west coast of mainland Greece. Scattered in the Ionian Sea, to the south of the Adriatic, the main islands of the chain, from north to south, are Corfu, Paxos, Lefkas, Ithaca, Kefalonia and Zakynthos.

The climate here is very different from the stark barrenness of the Cyclades and this makes chartering a superyacht in the Ionian Islands much more enjoyable, with milder winds, crystal clear blue waters and predictable weather patterns that create perfect sailing conditions.

The above-average annual rainfall results in a green, lush landscape, with mountainsides carpeted in orchids and wild flowers, interspersed with olive groves and cypresses in the springtime. Winters are mild and wet, though the summer months can be extremely hot as the islands do not receive the *meltemi* wind that cools the Aegean Islands. This is a wonderful place to visit in the shoulder season, beating the crowds entirely.









Day 1 ▶ Corfu

You'll find your yacht in Corfu, just beyond the Old Fortress. Stop for lunch in Garitsa Bay, and in the afternoon you can go ashore and visit the ancient city further south, then take a drive on the road running above the seafront that passes the old royal palace. Chartering here offers you the opportunity to view loggerhead sea turtles in Zakynthos, party the night away at Corfu's notorious Pink Palace complex, enjoy walking trails and traditional mountain villages on Lefkas, and relax on any number of beautiful unspoiled beaches or follow in the footsteps of Homer's Odyssey on Ithaca.

Day 2 ▶ Anti Paxos

Breakfast will be served during a pleasant morning cruise to Antipaxos, a tiny island with a great anchorage. Sheltered waters make this an excellent spot to launch the water toys and have some fun in the sun. Later, you may take a relaxing stroll to enjoy the beauty of the serene shoreline. Take advantage of the soothing atmosphere and spend the night here, with dinner enjoyed on the aft deck.

Day 3 ▶ Lefkas

The next morning, you'll head southwards 30 miles towards the mountainous island of Lefkas, with its stretches of golden beaches. A range of hills, the largest peak of which is Mount Stavrota, dominates the island and runs in a southwest direction, ending at Cape Doukato, a location famed in Greek mythology. With your yacht docked in Lefkas




town, enjoy a lazy day – it's a gorgeous spot for sunbathing on the beach and enjoying the water toys in the afternoon.

Day 4 ▶ Zakynthos

Today, sail south towards mythical Ithaca. Make the most of the advantages of yacht charter by taking the tender to the uninhabited Atokos Island for a picnic lunch ashore before you carry on towards Zakynthos for the night. With its beautiful scenery and excellent bathing beaches, the island is very popular, also as a party destination. Ashore, you can visit the famous Blue Caves and old frescoed churches. Drop the hook in Smugglers Cove, also known as Navagio Beach or Shipwreck Beach for the giant yacht wrecked ashore, a popular sightseeing spot. But if you anchor here overnight, you can beat the crowds to see it in the morning.

Day 5 ▶ Kefalonia

About 50 miles from Zakynthos, Kefalonia is the largest of the Ionian Islands, yet has only 32,000 residents, who mainly work in the tourist trade or farm the limestone mountains that rise to the





It's hard to leave Kefalonia, which is perhaps the most beautiful of all the stunning lonian Islands, but you must in order to visit more wonderful islands. Your destination is Paxos, a tiny island packed with trees and shrubs; it seems as if you're wandering through a garden as you walk up the hill to tour the Venetian castle that dominates the island.



At the end of the charter you'll head back to Corfu. It may be one of the most popular Greek islands, yet it's possible to find many places still untouched by mass tourism and the accompanying crowds. Before heading to the airport, pick up a few souvenirs in busy Corfu Town and perhaps enjoy one more delicious Greek meal.





Flavorful, colorful, beautiful and friendly – the islands off Thailand are something else

hailand is known as the land of smiles, and when you take a yacht charter here you'll be smiling too. With an abundance of islands, excellent diving, wonderful food and a great winter season climate, it provides out-of-the-ordinary cruising grounds that have a lot to offer.

The seven-day itinerary suggested takes in the best of the southern Andaman Sea locations, along Thailand's west coast, sheltered by the island of Phuket.

The islands are in equal parts exotic yet totally welcoming and fully accustomed to high-end tourism. Cruise past coconut plantations one day, then towering rock formations known as karsts the next. Snorkel over a colorful reef and anchor in a cove where you'll be the only yacht around.


You can just as easily find a fivestar spa on shore to provide your every pampering need. Friendly locals and wonderfully aromatic and spicy Thai food can also be found in abundance.

Thailand's Prime Minister is keen to make Phuket a superyacht hub, and changes to legislation saw the first foreign-flagged superyacht charter license granted in Thailand in 2015. The legislative changes are expected to lead to an increase in the number of luxury yacht charters in Thailand.

With a blend of stunning scenery, excellent dining and colorful cruising grounds, this is a place you won't be forgetting in a hurry.









Day 1 ► Phuket to Koh Roi

Board at Yacht Haven Marina. just a 15 minute drive from Phuket international airport. Cruise east, passing fish farms and coconut, rubber and pineapple plantations. Then tender or kayak to Koh Phanak. Over the years, the limestone has eroded, creating caves with secret lagoons to discover at low tide. After lunch, the yacht will head to Khao Phing Kan. aka James Bond Island, named after it featured in The Man With the Golden Gun. End the day at a private anchorage off Koh Roi.

Day 2 ► Koh Roi to Koh Pak Bia

The next stop is Koh Yao Noi, largely undeveloped, save for a few lovely resorts – indulge in a relaxing spa treatment at the Six Senses. Then head for Pak Bia for sundowners on your own private beach.

Day 3 ► Koh Pak Bia to Rai Leh Beach, Krabi

After breakfast, sail south to Krabi, bypassing the touristy bay of Ao Nang and going a little further to Rai Leh Beach. Krabi is a fabulous place for climbing. Try low-level bouldering right on the beach, or take on the roped climbs up the limestone cliffs.



Day 4 ▶ Rai Leh Beach to Phi

Phi Don via Ban Pa Ko Dam

Heading south, you'll see the nearby peaks of Ko Dam.
Anchor either side of a wonderful white sandspit that joins the two islands. Take a stroll on shore or go snorkeling – the water is unbelievably clear. Arriving in Phi Phi Don, where Ton Sai bay is the place to make the most of Phi Phi's legendary and slightly wild nightlife.



This morning, get an early start to Phi Phi Leh, popular for its starring role in the Leonardo DiCaprio movie *The Beach*. Then it's on towards the islands of the Koh Racha group. The water is very clear here, making it one of the best places for diving. Whales have been spotted here as well as large sailfish.

Day 6 ► Koh Racha to Nai Harn Bay

Nai Harn Bay lies on the southwest corner of Phuket. The headland above the bay, with its elephant shrine, is a very popular place to watch the sunset into the Andaman Sea. This is a good place to enjoy a slice of beach life, relax and eat some fiery Thai food fresh from the local restaurants.



Day 7 ▶ Nai Harn Bay to Patong or Nai Yang via Kata

Take a slow cruise up Phuket's west coast, with bay after bay rimmed with pale soft sand, high-end resorts, numerous villas, hotels and bars. Patong Bay is popular with large yachts. There are high-rise developments, endless faux designer shops, restaurants and bars. If you prefer the quiet life then Nai Yang Bay, to the north of the island, is the spot for you. Here you'll find a few very good resorts, but the best food is to be had in the beach restaurants. This is a nice, authentic way to round off your trip. After darkness falls, take a dip and enjoy the explosion of green phosphorescence as the sea comes alive.




Untouched cruising grounds, epic dive sites – and hardly another yacht to be seen

or those seeking somewhere entirely different, look no further than the islands of Indonesia. The area of Raja Ampat, just northwest of Papua, is a sight to behold. This archipelago offers untouched cruising grounds where you'll stay in breathtaking anchorages, dive with the most vibrant of underwater life, explore in the jungle to spot elusive birds of paradise and hike to the tops of jade green peaks for staggering views.

There are strict regulations to keep this place as pristine as it is, so only a handful of yachts are allowed to charter in Raja Ampat.

Your luxurious phinisi-style yacht - the local Indonesian design - will have a doting crew on hand to cater to your every need, whether serving up a delicious meal, pampering you with a massage or throwing a fun beach barbecue.

The Raja Ampat archipelago comprises four main islands - Misool to the south, Salawati and Batanta in the middle, and Waigeo to the north - surrounded by more than 1,500 smaller islands and islets. The whole region is almost entirely untouched by human hands. There are no chic hotels, only a couple of eco-dive resorts on the main islands, and the waters are blissfully traffic-free. With a handful of bucket list dives and some of the clearest waters in the world you will be pleased to have this paradise to yourself for a truly unforgettable experience.









Day 1 ▶ Sorong, West Papua


Arrive in Sorong, where your yacht and crew will be waiting to welcome you on board. Set sail for the Raja Ampat archipelago. Depending on the winds and the tides, spend the afternoon snorkeling or try a dive with an experienced PADI instructor, or kayak, water ski, fish from the tenders, visit a village or relax on a pristine white sand beach.

Day 2 ▶ Dampier Strait

The Dampier Strait has strong currents carrying planktonic feasts that attract hundreds of manta rays in the area near Arborek Island. Spend the morning diving down to the shallow sandy bottom and wait for the giant mantas to pass overhead, or swim with these gentle giants at the surface. In the late afternoon, trek through the forest of Sawinggrai village on Pulau Gam, guided by a local, to catch the mating rituals of the elusive and ethereal red bird of paradise. Then dine under a starry sky, while your yacht sails northwest towards the Wayag archipelago.

Day 3 & 4 ▶ Wayag Archipelago Cruise by tender or kayak





Day 5 ► Fam, Penemu and the Yeben Islands

Your yacht will arrive at these smaller, pretty islands. Paddle through the uninhabited islets and turquoise waters surrounding Pulau Fam, stroll on foot or kayak the perfect white sandy circle of tiny Pulau Yeben. Overnight, sail to the southern realms of the Raja Ampat archipelago.

Day 6 & 7 ▶ Misool and Tomolol Cave

Misool is one of the southern islands and it's become a mecca for divers worldwide. Dip your paddle into yet another "secret bay" rimmed with steep rainforest walls and



listen to the echoing birdsong at dawn. Tread lightly over turtle tracks on the powdery white beaches of Misool and journey though the ethereal Gua Sacral ancestral caves of Tomolol, the former burial site of the indigenous Papuans. It is a fitting farewell to the archipelago.

Day 8 ▶ Return to Sorong

Bid farewell to the crew and your yacht in Sorong, and then fly to Denpasar. You may end your trip here or alternatively opt to extend your trip by visiting Bali. The rest of Indonesia is bound to feel hectic, though, after the glorious solitude of Raja Ampat.



WHITSUNDAY

Get ready for soul-stirring cruising experiences in the land down under

et along the southern realm of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park in Queensland, Australia, the colorful Whitsundays are a magnet for snorkelers and divers. These islands offer up abundant marine life in gorgeous turquoise waters, exceptional coral creations and unique landscapes.

Named by Captain Cook, the group of 74 islands were discovered in 1770. Though the Whitsundays represent the largest group of offshore islands in Australia, to this day only eight of the islands are inhabited with resorts.

With an array of activities offered in unique surroundings, the area boasts some of the best cruising experiences in the world. Direct commercial and private flights allow guests to be immersed in the contrasting white and turquoise color palette even before boarding a superyacht.

There is much to discover beneath the water as the Whitsundays are home to 1,500 species of fish, 360 species of hard coral, one third of the world's soft corals, 600 species of starfish, six species of marine turtles, and 30 species of whales and dolphins.

The ideal weather is May to September when rainfall is low, with the peak season for visiting superyachts starting in the first month of the Australian "winter" in June. The sea temperature is about 73°F and there are 11 hours of sunlight per day, so you're welcomed by long sunny days and warm, beautiful waters.





ITINERARY



Day 1 ▶ Hamilton Island

Fly into the small airport on Hamilton Island, the largest in the Whitsundays though it measures only two square miles. Enjoy lunch at the Hamilton Island Yacht Club or, depending on the group, a private table can be arranged at the stunning, adult-only Qualia Resort. The yacht will then take you on a cruise around the island to Perseverance Reef or Dent Island for a first swim and snorkel in the heavenly water.

Day 2 ► Neck Bay

In the morning, the captain will guide the yacht to Neck Bay, your first secluded experience of the Whitsundays. Fantastic snorkeling is found along the coast here, tucked between Shaw and Lindeman Island. When you step out of the warm water, walk across the bay and the "neck" from west to east. sprawl on a secluded beach covered by unusual polished shells and coral varieties. Spend the night anchored in this sheltered spot, enjoying a gourmet meal.

Day 3 ⊳ The Narrows & Cid Island

Wake up to admire a tropical sunrise as the yacht moves westward towards Long Island Sound. Continue on to Cid Island, where you can kayak through the mangroves before dropping anchor by Hill Rock Reef or Cid Harbour for a quiet evening and overnight.

Day 4 ▶ Whitsunday & Hook Island

Start your day with a short hike up to Whitsunday Peak to enjoy spectacular 360 degree



views over Cid Harbour. This afternoon, unleash the water toys along the west coast of Whitsunday Island where jet skis are authorized. Then cruise on to Hook Island, which combines forest walks, pure blue waters and white silica beaches. View Aboriginal rock art at Nara Inlet, created by the Ngaro people, and take a 30 minute walk leading to a breathtaking view, before enjoying dinner on board.

Day 5 ▶ Langford Island & the Outer Reef

Get ready for an out-of-thisworld experience today! Depart Hook Island towards Langford Island, which is a great spot for a beach barbecue. After lunch, the yacht will head back towards Hook Island to explore Butterfly Bay and its coral outcrops populated by colorful reef fish. Then, there's the option to head to the Outer Reef. Rendezvous diving can be organized for the next morning, and your dive guide will be recounting his reef stories over dinner that night.

Day 6 ► Hardy Reef & Hook Reef

Wake to a breakfast view unlike any other – it's time to discover what the Outer Reef is all about. Snorkeling is excellent, as is





diving off nearby drop-offs where you'll find turtles, reef sharks and barracuda.
A helicopter tour will reveal the famous Heart Reef. Tonight the crew could organize a fun theme dinner, and afterwards you can watch a slideshow from all the photos of the day.

Day 7 ▶ Dumbell Island & Whitehaven Beach

Before heading back to civilization, your yacht will stop by Dumbell Island, populated by a wide variety of birds including sea eagles, which can be fed off the aft deck. Before reaching the unique and much sought after sight of Whitehaven Beach, take a hike up Hill Inlet and indulge in the astonishing views. The inlet far below you is a striking mix of aqua and white swirls as the island's famed sands shift through the waters, creating beautiful patterns. Your yacht will anchor, letting you experience the fine silica sand, which is great for polishing jewelry! Finally, cruise back to Hamilton Island for one last night in an anchorage or the marina, and maybe a last dinner ashore with your captain and crew, recounting all the lifelong memories you have made.

Day 1 ► Whangaroa

Day 2 ▶ Roberton Island, Bay of Islands, via the Cavallis



Day 1 ► Denaru to Musket Cove

The trip begins with a short, one and a half hour cruise southwest to the Mamanuca Islands, where you spend the day exploring. The snorkeling here is excellent owing to an abundance of soft corals and tropical fish. Spend the night anchored off the stunning Musket Cove Resort.

Day 2 ▶ Waya Island

After breakfast, we sail three hours northwest to Navadra and Vanua. These islands have beautiful beaches and great snorkeling on their garden reefs. The beach can be accessed by tender from mid to high tide, and paddleboards or kayaks at low tide. If weather permits, the yacht will anchor here for the night or sail one hour north to Waya Island and anchor at Yalobi Bay, which is more protected.

Day 3 ➤ Naviti & Matacawa Island

The yacht will head further north to Cuvu Bay on the southern end of Naviti Island.





which offers a rare chance to swim with manta rays. Naviti was one of the two islands in the Yasawa Group that suffered serious damage from Cyclone Winston in 2016, but plenty of anchorages escaped the storm. If you visit, donations of schoolbooks and clothes are much appreciated. Continue two hours north to the famed Blue Lagoon near Nanuya and Matacawa islands.

Day 4 ➤ The Blue Lagoon & Sawa-i-Lau Island

Blue Lagoon was the location of the 1980 movie of the same name, starring Brooke Shields. The snorkeling here is breathtaking and the beaches are pristine. Your yacht can anchor here for the night or move to nearby Sawai-Lau Island, which is famous for its underwater caves. The lagoon has some great snorkeling spots and the shell markets are worth a visit, too.

Day 5 ▶ Yasawa-i-Rara

The yacht will sail two hours further north to Yasawa-i-Rara, which has one of Fiji's best beaches, Champagne Beach - a crescent of powdery white sand, an ideal spot for



a barbecue. The snorkeling here is terrific, too. In the evening, you can go ashore to watch a *meke* (a traditional Fijian dance) and a *kava* ceremony, where it is customary to give a gift of *yaqona* (kava root) to the head of the village.

Day 6 ► Towards Denarau

For the last two days of the trip, you will make your way back south to return to Port Denarau Marina, revisiting favorite spots or exploring new coves along the way, such as the beautiful Somosomo Bay on the north of Naviti Island, or Paradise Cove in the south. Get your fill of South Pacific bliss before returning to the real world.
